OUR BAS EDUCATION

In Canada, the education of the architect is a four-year undergraduate degree followed by a professional Masters degree of architecture (M.Arch). At Carleton, our undergraduate degree is a **four-year Honours degree**.

The Azrieli School of Architecture & Urbanism (ASAU) Bachelor of Architectural Studies (BAS) has three BAS programs:

- Conservation & Sustainability
- Design
- Urbanism

Each program is organized around studio courses. Taught in small groups, studios form the core of BAS education. Each studio focuses on a new design project and the scale and complexity of these projects increase as students advance through the program.


Our BAS has co-op, and international exchange opportunities

Admission to Carleton's BAS program is highly competitive. We receive approx. 725 applications for a total of 100 spots in our BAS.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- English (ENG4U)
- Physics (SPH4U)
- Adv. Functions (MHF4U)

And three more 4U/4M courses for a total of six grade 12 U/M courses.

To calculate the overall average, we take the three prerequisites and add in the next best three courses at the 4U/4M level.

Minimum Cut-off 74-76%

Admitted students are higher than the cut-off, typically mid-80% range with strong portfolios.

PROGRAM **DESCRIPTIONS**

The Bachelor of Architectural Studies in **Conservation and Sustainability** addresses both the conservation of historic architecture and principles of sustainable design as applied to buildings and the urban fabric. C&S students explore contemporary theories of critical conservation, adaptive reuse, integration of new and historic structures, and traditional and emerging construction methods to reconsider our past for tomorrow. C&S courses are supported within ASAU by the School of Indigenous and Canadian Studies.

The Bachelor of Architectural Studies in **Design** explores the development of new buildings and programs. Design is increasingly focused on community engaged, and environmentally responsive work. Projects explore the impact of buildings on existing communities and their surroundings. Studios are supported by a robust sequence of technology, history, and media courses to form a comprehensive understanding of building design practices, and its social, technical, and regulatory context. Design courses are supported within ASAU and by the Department of Architectural History and Theory.

The Bachelor of Architectural Studies in **Urbanism** examines the form of the city and the complex network of forces, such as climate, technology, politics, transportation, and economics, that produce our built environment. Project-based studio courses explore the impact of urbanization on both the traditional core and the expanding periphery. Students in Urbanism can pursue a range of careers from planning to urban design, architecture, and landscape architecture. Urbanism courses are supported within ASAU and by the Department of Geography.

OPPORTUNITIES

CO-OP!

Co-op is optional at ASAU. It is available for all full-time BAS students with a CGPA average of B (8.0/12). Students in co-op complete three work terms, for a minimum of twelve months of work experience.


Co-op starts in the summer after the completion of our thrid year. Student in co-op require an additional year to complete our BAS degree.

STUDY ABROAD OPTIONS INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE


Carleton maintains exchange agreements with numerous schools of architecture around the world. Many students spend a full term abroad for the winter term of their third year


DSA


In the fall term of their third year of studies, all BAS students have the option of participating in a one to two-week Directed Studies Abroad (DSA) program, led by their studio professor. Recent DSA trips have included China, Japan, Europe and India.



FIRST & FOURTH YEAR







The BAS first year is shared, with all three programs following the same fall and winter term courses.

In the second and third years, students pursue program specific studios, supported by technology, history and theory courses.

In the fourth year, students once again come together in the Housing and Options Studio, bringing their knowledge of Conservation & Sustainbility, Design and Urbanism to bear on complex, large-scale projects that integrate the skills from all three programs.




